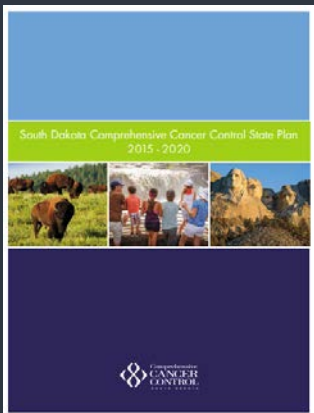

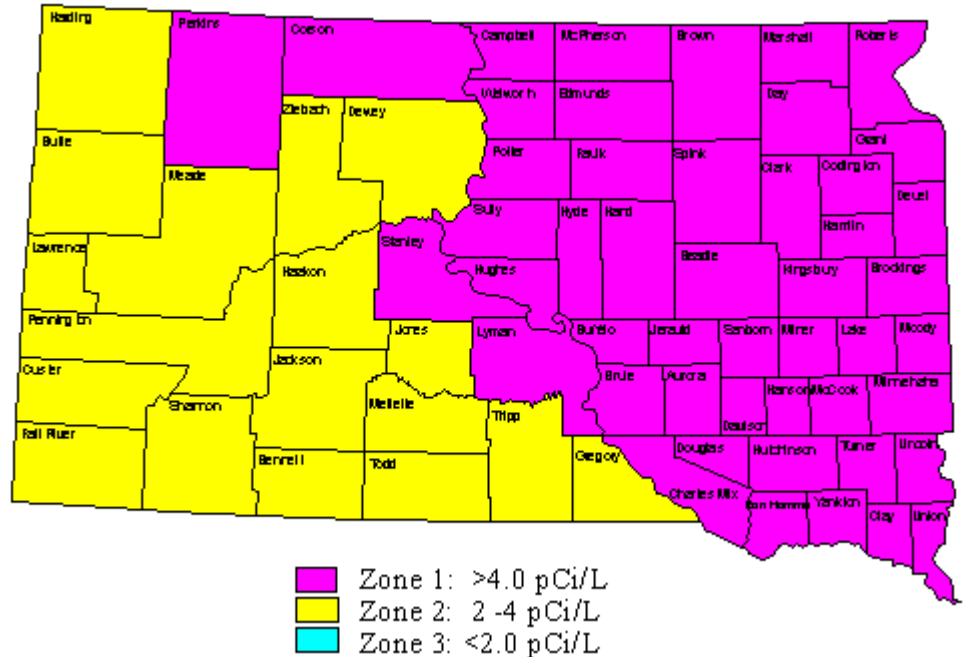

*Maps and tables are not intended to be used to determine if a home in a given area should be tested for radon. Homes with elevated levels of radon have been found in all areas of the state. All homes should be tested regardless of geographic location.*

**South Dakota Radon Levels:** Since the late 1980's, radon levels have been measured throughout the state of South Dakota. This data has been collected and compared to geological formations to yield the map shown below. The zone classifications are based upon being able to predict the likelihood of finding certain ranges of radon concentrations when conducting short-term radon measurements. The eastern portion of the state is Zone 1 with the balance being Zone 2. There are no Zone 3 areas in South Dakota.

South Dakota provides cash and/or in kind match of 40% or greater on the funds received for the EPA SIRG.

## South Dakota Pending/Enacted Legislation

Currently, there is no statutory authority to regulate indoor radon or the qualifications of those persons that perform radon measurement and mitigation services professionally in our state.

**South Dakota Codified Laws §§ 43-4-37--44:** Requires sellers of residential property to provide a form disclosing known hazardous conditions including radon, mold, methane gas, lead paint, asbestos insulation, urea formaldehyde foam insulation, and toxic materials, as well as any known testing for such conditions.
